Canberra – OMG!! – our first night in Canberra was -6°C!! Whose decision was it to come into Canberra for a few days? It must have been Norm – it couldn't have been me. Well, what started out as a 5 day stay turned into 10 days but it did give us a chance to catch up with some friends. Also, the battery had died in my car at home and we replaced it and then drove it around while we were in town. The owners of the park are currently spending quite a bit of money to upgrade the park – the laundry has all been redone with new machines and the bistro has recently opened. There are plans to upgrade all the caravan sites and the amenities block. Not before time.

We certainly did notice some changes in Canberra after 12 months away. We noticed that a new art work has appeared on the Tuggeranong Pkwy – an orange monstrosity, with eyes, that looks like 2 (or more) crabs mating! I guess we voted for this, the same way we <u>apparently</u> voted for the Arboretum. It is amazing we can afford these so-called 'works of art' (???) but the local radio station has to run a fund-

raiser to earn money for a humidicrib for the hospital! I still can't work out why we needed an Arboretum when we have the Botanical Gardens. We have seen some interesting 'works of art' on our travels and every time we have said it must a John Stanhope special or one of his clones!

While we have been travelling we have been using a mail forwarding agent – Landbase – located in Gosford. We took the opportunity while we were in the area to meet Jan Baetz, the owner of Landbase, and to pick up our mail. Jan's service has been great and we owe thanks to Paddy and Margaret (Canberra Caravan Club) for recommending her. Landbase is great for people who do not have other options like

willing family members or, like us, have a post office box. Australia Post will not accommodate more than one forwarding address so, everything is forwarded from our box to Landbase in Gosford and then when requested by us, is forwarded to whatever address we nominate. Jan runs her business out of a spare room in her home, with one other person to help – she told Norm that some weeks she processes 4-5 thousand pieces of mail! When organising this sort of service you must remember to try and cut down your mail to only what is necessary ie, advise Australia Post not to forward any junk mail. We also put all our household accounts onto direct debit and email or on-line notification.

Forster-Tuncurry – our main reason for coming here was to catch up with Ken and Gai, a couple we met in Broome and, who we kept meeting up with all the way around to Port Lincoln – if you recall from a previous newsletter, we also joined together with Ken and Gai in Perth for Christmas lunch. We had a lovely few days with. Our caravan park was right in town so we were able to walk almost everywhere. On the first Thursday of July every year they have crazy day on the main street, which is blocked off for the occasion. All the businesses have sale tables outside – Norm managed to pick up a Jarvis Walker rod and reel and an extra reel, all for \$70.

Byron Bay – 20°C – bliss! We stayed right in town at First Sun Holiday Park. We have stayed here before and we think it is great. It is right on the beach, walking distance to all shops, restaurants and, our favourite coffee shop in Byron is around the corner. The park is extremely well run and the security is high. Your picture is taken at check-in and there is a security guard on duty every night. There are zero tolerance park rules ie no anti-social behaviour, excessive noise or drinking and, no gathering of more than 6 people on any one site unless prior permission has been granted. The gates to the beach are locked at around 6pm. There is a lovely BBQ area on the point overlooking the beach and it is a great spot for happy hour – you can hear the nightly performance of bongo drums at the beach from here too.

The Centrelink Office is quite central in Byron and, there would appear to be a number of 'clients' hanging around (we have heard this equates to being a Government employee of sorts). Gold Coast - we originally were headed for a caravan park north of Surfers but they were unable to accommodate our size van – they directed us to Tallebudgera Creek CP and what a great alternative. We originally planned to stay a couple of weeks before moving up to Noosa. Reports indicated it was still pretty wet in places up north so we decided to stat at Tallebudgera – we are now booked in until 25 August. The park is lovely and very clean and tidy. The pools are lovely but it is still too cool for us. Since we arrived the weather has been lovely during the day (average of 21°C) and the nights are cool (average of 9°C). We have been walking every day –

there is a beautiful walk around Burleigh Head and a great coffee spot half way – about 2.5 kms round trip. The surfers are out in force most days although some do take some serious chances. One day we saw one get thrown onto the rocks by a wave. He did walk out but very gingerly and, I suspect he will be pretty bruised and sore for a few days. Norm said he had an American accent so he may have been a visitor – unfortunately visitors are not always aware of the dangers and just go for it.

There were not very many makes of caravans on display, nor were there all that many exhibitors for other camping and caravanning supplies. We were looking for a small Coleman table but Coleman did not have a display there. The only supplier there was Anaconda and they only had a couple of Coleman products on sale.
